METHODOLOGY

The 2016 Colorado Statewide OmniPoll was conducted by Talmey-Drake Research & Strategy, Inc., a public opinion and market research firm in Boulder, Colorado. The results of this survey are based on 505 random telephone interviews with Colorado voters, conducted from January 6 to 14, 2016. Quotas were established to obtain equal representation for men and women, and an appropriate representation from among certain counties. Results were weighted by age to more accurately reflect the makeup of Colorado voters. A random sample of 505 has a worst-case 95% confidence interval of plus or minus 4.4% about any one reported percentage.

¹ Quotas were established for Adams, Arapahoe, Boulder, Denver, Douglas, El Paso, Jefferson, Larimer, Mesa, Pueblo and Weld.
